## MRS. DR. SMALL PASSES TO THE GREAT BEYOND AT EARLY HOUR TODAY

Mrs. A. L. Small, wife of Dr. A. L. Small, the well-known citizen and prominent horticulturist and mother of Judge John Small and Senator Len Small passed away at the residence on south Eighth avenue about 3 o'clock this morning after a brief illness with capillary bronchitis.

Her death was peaceful, and painless, she sleeping away after a life of good works and right living.

Mrs. Small became a member of the Congregational church while in California where she and Dr. Small spent last winter.

She leaves to mourn her loss, her sorrowing husband, and the following children. Judge John Small, Senator Len Small, Suzanne C. Small, now in Paris, France, studying art, Mrs. Humphreys, Long Beach, California, with whom Dr. and Mrs. Small spent the winter and who accompanied them home to Kankakee, and Mrs. Mabel McKinstry, wife of D. S. McKinstry, of Hospital.

Mrs. Small had been in ill health for several years and spent the winter in California thinking it would benefit her. She returned home the latter part of March and since

that time she grew steadily worse. She was not confined to her bed until Saturday, however, when her condition grew serious.

Born in East.

Calista J. Currier was born in Enfield, New Hampshire on July 3, 1834, her mother being of the famous Choates in New England. Her father, John Currier, with his family, moved to Indiana in her early youth, where he was a prominent and wealthy farmer of Porter county, Ind. He was active in politics and one of the most widely known men in that part of the state. He died in 1860.

Miss Currier was reared in the west and was educated in Chicago. On November 17, 1853 she was united in marriage to A. L. Small a young practicing physician. They moved to Rockville where he practiced his profession for a time, before moving to Kankakee, which city was afterwards their home.
