

Small named president of Chicago Times

CHICAGO — The Chicago Times Co., which publishes *Chicago Times Magazine*, announced today that Thomas P. Small, 40, chairman of the board, has been elected president and publisher, replacing Todd Fandell.

Small continues as editorial director and will assume overall editorial direction of the magazine.

In addition, Barry J. Bowlus, 31, has been named operations director. Bowlus' primary responsibility will be to oversee all of the magazine's non-editorial operations.

Both appointments, which were made at a board of directors meeting Monday in Chicago, are effective immediately.

"Our plan has been to produce a bi-monthly magazine of exceptionally high quality, in terms of both stories and graphics, with the best talent in the city," Small said. "We intend to offer a more aggressive, unconstrained type of investigative journalism than Chicago's other city magazines. We will illuminate Chicago's major institutions, from the 'inside,' rather than the 'official' perspective.

"Another major goal is to inform our readers of the very best of Chicago's culture. We will celebrate the character of Chicago and engage the city's most interesting people in a perpetual discussion to define what makes the city great.

"A third major goal is to give our readers a sense of the drama and lasting impact of Chicago's history — the foundation upon which its character is built.

"My priority will be to accelerate achievement of these goals. I pledge to our readers a more exciting and informative magazine and can say that we are increasing our editorial budget immediately."

Small has been a long-time executive officer and director of Small Newspaper Group, Inc. In addition to publishing several daily newspapers, Small Newspaper Group was one of

the principal owners of *Family Weekly Magazine*. *Family Weekly*, with a circulation of 10 million, had the fourth highest circulation of any magazine in the United States at that time. It was sold in 1980 to CBS for a substantial profit.

Previously, Small was publisher of the Roseville (California) *Press-Tribune*. The Associated Press named the *Press-Tribune* as the third best newspaper in the under 50,000 circulation category in California last year.

"I'm looking forward to working with Tom Small to make *Chicago Times Magazine* an essential city publication," said Bowlus. "There is little doubt that there's a need and a market for the type of magazine we will be publishing."

Bowlus, a certified public accountant, is a graduate of Northern Illinois University. For the past six years, he has been associated with Time, Inc., in Chicago, first as an international financial analyst, then as business manager for the Time publications (including *Time*, *Sports Illustrated*, *Life*, *People*, *Fortune* and *Discover*) and most recently, as subscription service director. He and his wife reside in Chicago.
