## Grace Small dies at 91

Grace Burrell Small, 91, Kankakee, died at her home Wednesday night after an illness of eight

Mrs. Small was the widow of Leslie C. Small, former publisher of The Daily Journal, and the daughter-in-law of the late Illinois Gov. Len Small of

Kankakee, who served from 1920 to 1928. Her two sons, the late Len H. Small and the late Burrell L. Small, were long connected with publish-

ing and broadcasting.

Len Small was publisher of The Journal and chief executive officer of six daily newspapers in Illinois, Indiana and Minnesota, and a weekly newspaper in Iowa. He was killed in an automobile accident March

Burrell L. Small was president and chairman of Burrell L. Small was president and chairman of the Mid America Media Group, which operates 11 radio stations and two cable television stations in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Oklahoma and South Carolina. He died Feb. 22 after a long illness. Mrs. Small's late husband was a banker, businessman, farmer, politician and former state official. He became publisher of the forerunner of The Daily Journal in 1913.

When she was a year old, the family moved to Chicago where she attended the first seven years of school. The family moved to Kankakee when her father opened the Burrell Mfg. Co., a foundry. The Burrell family lived at 753 S. Greenwood Ave. and then at 622 S. Greenwood Ave. in Kankakee.

She spent her first years after high school as a teacher in Kankakee County. Her first assignment was a rural school in the St. Anne area where she lived with a family during the week, returning home on weekends.

The trip home meant walking to Wichert and boarding a train for Momence. After a wait at Mo-

mence, she would board another train to Kankakee.

The trip took nearly five hours.

Mrs. Small later taught at Butz School in rural
Limestone Township and at Franklin School in Kan-

Mr. and Mrs. Small were married on Oct. 30, 1912 at the Burrell residence at 622 S. Greenwood Ave. Mr. Small died on Jan. 11, 1957.

Mrs. Small was active in numerous clubs and organizations. She was a longtime member of Asbury organizations, one was a longtime member of Asbury United Methodist Church and the Judy Williamson Circle. She was a member of Zonta International, Lyric and Travel Club, Kankakee Country Club and the Kankakee County Historical Society.

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She was also a member of the National Federation of Republican Women of Kankakee County, Riverside Medical Center Auxiliary, the Colonial Club, Thimble Club and Tau Beta Phi, at one time the oldest sorority in Kankakee.

Her husband was active in the Hartley Hitches, a social club formed in 1908 at old Kankakee High school, and Mrs. Small participated in the annual reunions it held for many years. She was a 50-year member of Kankakee Woman's Club and had been awarded life membership. She was a charter member of the Kankakee Kultivators.

In recent years, she presented the Grace B. Small Young Artists Award, given annually after competition among outstanding young planists. The winner presents a concert each year with the Kankakee Symphony Orchestra.

She was a vice president and a director of the Kankakee Daily Journal Co., which publishes The Journal, a director of Times Press Publishing Co., which publishes the Streator Times Press, and a vice resident and director of the Ottawa Daily Times at Ottawa.

She was an officer and director of the various Mid America Media companies, and an assistant treasurer and director of Mid America Audio-Video Inc. which operates radio station WKAN in Kankakee. She was an assistant secretary and director of Kankakee TV Cable Co, and was a vice president and director of Imagery Inc.

Among the contributions to the community by Mrs. Small and her husband were the Centennial Room at Gov. Small Memorial Park and the large stained-glass west window at Asbury United Methodist

Jean Alice Small, editor and publisher of The Journal, said today, "Grace Small was my mother-in-law of 41 years. Although she was feminine in appear-ance and delicate in manner, she was in truth, a very strong lady.

"Like everyone else, she had many blows through-out her life, but none greater than losing both her sons, her only children, within a year.

"She was gallant in grief and although she lived

more than 91 years, she never grew old.
"We shall all miss her."
Her other daughter-in-law, Reva Small of Kankakee, president of Mid America Media, said, "Grace personified her name in every deed and action. She was at all times a lady in every sense of the word. Her passing signals the end of an era of gentility, charm and warmth. I shall miss her, for she was
