Mrs. Arthur E. Inglesh Dies This Morning

Death Results From Cerebral Hemorrhage Suffered Early Friday

Mrs. May Inglesh, 54, wife of Gen. A. E. Inglesh and only daughter of the late Governor and Mrs. Len Small of Kankakee, died at St. Mary hospital this morning at 5:15. Her death was the result of a cerebral hemorrhage suffered about 1 o'clock Friday morning at her home at 856 South Chicago avenue.

Mrs. Inglesh's death came as a sudden shock to her many friends and acquaintances for she had seemed in good health Thursday afternoon when she attended the funeral of the late Senator Louis E. Beckman. Later on Thursday she visited the Hertz Memorial temple following the death of an uncle, William Gray.

Residents of this community will long remember Mrs. Inglesh for her gracious hospitality and her friendliness. She was a distinguished lady and hostess and enjoyed entertaining her friends. Her pleasant manner and graciousness made guests feel welcome in her home and those who knew her well admired her deep interest in her family and the warmth reflected in her home.

Noted for YWCA Work

Mrs. Inglesh was well known for her untiring work at the Y. W. C. A. She served six years on the board of directors of this organization and also succeeding terms as vice president and president.

During this time she was largely responsible for numerous improvements of the Y. W. C. A. building, grounds and living conditions and the improvements she was able to bring about resulted in greater activity and membership in the organization. Mrs. Inglesh enjoyed being able to help others through her work and took great pride in the success of the Y. W. C. A.

Funeral services will be held for Mrs. Inglesh at 1525 West Station street, the former home of her parents, the late Governor and Mrs. Len Small, at 2 p. m. Monday with Dr. Morgan Williams officiating. Burial will be in the family lot in

Mound Grove cemetery. Friends may call at 1525 West Station street Sunday afternoon and evening and until the time of the funeral Monday.

Mrs. Inglesh was born June 10, 1891, the daughter of the late Governor and Mrs. Len Small, at 1525 West Station street, Kankakee. She attended a rural school on route 113 South and later attended Kankakee high school and a local business school. Following her business school education she enrolled at the Illinois Woman's college, now called Mac Murray college at Jacksonville, Illinois.

Marries Arthur Inglesh

On October 15, 1915 she was united in marriage with Arthur E. Inglesh of Grand Rapids, Mich. and moved to Quincy, Illinois where Mr. Inglesh was associated with the Northern Illinois Utility corporation. In 1917 Mr. Inglesh enlisted in the United States army, at the beginning of World War I and Mrs. Inglesh returned to Kankakee where she resided with her parents until Mr. Inglesh's return from the war in Europe in 1919. At that time Gen. and Mrs. Inglesh moved to Springfield, Illinois where Gen. Inglesh served in the state department of banks.

In 1922 Mrs. Len Small died and Mrs. Inglesh became hostess of the mansion in Springfield where she remained throughout the administration of her father, former Governor Small. During these years from 1922 until 1929 she frequently accompanied her father on trips throughout the state and nation and she took great pride in her responsibilities as first lady of the state.

In 1929 Gen. and Mrs. Inglesh returned to Kankakee where Gen. Inglesh entered the bond and investment business and later became chairman of the board of directors of the First Trust and Savings bank.

Mrs. Inglesh was a member of the First Methodist church of Kankakee, the D.A.R., the Illinois Woman's club and the Kankakee Woman's club in addition to the positions she held at the Y.W.C.A.

Surviving besides her husband, Gen. Inglesh, are a daughter, Jacleri May, a brother Leslie C. Small and two nephews Len and Burrell Small, all of Kankakee.
